Investing AUD\$260 in modern beehives—Kenya Top Bar and Langstroth—provided beekeepers with superior tools. Importantly, these sample hives will serve as models for local artisans, making more affordable hives available to the community.



### Soil and Water Conservation: Nurturing the Land

AUD\$185 was used to train beekeepers in soil and water conservation techniques. Practical demonstrations of contour siting, trench digging, and Napier grass planting along contour bunds established sustainable landcare systems to reduce the impact of climate change.

The project's success is undeniable. A total of 200 beekeepers (120 women and 80 men) from Ngenge and Sundet sub-counties, along with 50 junior and youth landcare members from Ngenge Primary School, directly benefited. The project has resulted in:

- Improved knowledge and skills in enhancing honey quality and marketing by-products.
