Roots of Resilience: Transforming Khadejbi Through Conservation

A Green Milestone for Khadejbi

The CRNG team successfully completed a tree planting exercise in Khadejbi, Ghana, with the support of Global Landcare Australia. The primary goal was to provide the community with real tools to combat climate change and promote conservation while engaging everyone in sustainable development practices. It was a productive day of shared purpose that resulted in 50 new tree seedlings being added to the local landscape.

Working Together for the Land

The success of this initiative relied heavily on the dedication of local volunteers and workers. Because the soil in the project area can be quite tough, the team utilised pick axes to ensure every seedling was properly rooted and had the best chance to grow. Shovels were also on hand to assist with the digging, and these tools will remain in the community to support future environmental projects. To keep energy levels high during the physical work, light refreshments were provided as a way to thank the participants for their incredible efforts.

Summary and Next Steps

This project successfully turned a vision for environmental resilience into reality by planting 50 seedlings in the Khadejbi soil. By providing the right tools and local support, the exercise not only improved the landscape but also strengthened the bond between the community and their natural environment.


